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



As fellow card collectors, I'm sure you guys have been in the same situation that I'm in regularly. People asking: "Why do you want to pay that much money for a card? *It's just a piece of cardboard*." I shake my head and laugh at those people, and even my best friends don't understand why I collect hockey cards. I'm not surprised, though. Living in a small, non-hockey crazy country like Denmark isn't exactly a hotbed for hockey like Toronto or Montreal, but it's becoming a top 3 sport here. goalies didn't make the final checklist) and 48 different pictures were taken.




My View of the Current State of Trading and a Possible Solution By Scott Kozlowski aka Scottkoz

It has been quite a bit of time since I last penned an article for Sports Card Forum. A lot has changed for me during the last year. My family moved into our dream home north of Niagara Falls, NY. It has a ton to offer, outdoor concerts during the summer months galore, festivals, country living and one of the best school districts in Western New York, just in time for Olivia to start kindergarten in the fall. It did come with a price.

That price was having to own 2 houses for nearly 8 months. This price caused me to sell most of my collection and take time away from the hobby. It is a decision that I do not regret at all!! After all, this is a hobby and would make that decision again if needed. With this said, I'm happy to be back in at least a mode of being able to buy again.

Since I have returned, I noticed a couple of things immediately. First, was the number of new people that have joined SCF and seem to be active in the community; it is good to see that the hobby is alive and well. The second item though is a bit more troublesome. It seems it has become a bit tougher to reach a deal.

My initial thought that it was me, not having a lot of items to work with since having to move most of my collection. But upon another look at the SCF transaction figures for May, 2013, there have just under 2200 total completed transactions (2191) for the month of May as of May 28, 2013. While this seems like a nice, healthy number, you would have to go back to November of 2007 to see a number this low (2125).



I took a bit of deeper dive into this, thinking that this is an anomaly and it's just a quiet month. It is not a quiet month, rather a downward trend in transactions. The following graph is a 4 year look at the number of Completed Transactions on SCF.

Several items stick out to me from this chart:

* Januarys see an upward change in the number of trades from December

* Septembers see the largest drop in the number of trades from August

* Julys usually see a upward change, except for 2012, when the decline becomes quite apparent

I cannot begin to think about every potential issue that could be causing this trend; however, some of the issues that I see contributing to this decline in activity include lockouts in 3 of the 4 major North American sports, cost, both in shipping and new product and finally, us as members of the community.



1) Since 2011, fans of the NFL, NBA and NHL have all suffered through a lockout. While the NFL lockout did not seem to have an impact to the hobby, the NBA and NHL lockouts had significant impacts to the hobby. In both cases, rookie cards from the lockout seasons were tolled into the next year, NBA rookies from 2011-12 were in 2012-13 products and NHL rookies from 2012-13 are tolled to the 2013-14 releases.

The residual effects of the lockouts have been a loss of people that were collecting, become upset with the sports, thus causing them to lose interest and not being active in the hobby or leaving the hobby altogether.

2) As a hockey collector primarily, the cost of shipping from the Buffalo Area to Canada has nearly quadrupled in the past 18 months!

Today, it costs a member that ships to Canada \$6.55 to send a 1 or 2 ounce package to Canada and jumps to \$7.35 to send a 3 ounce package (it is a bit cheaper to create the labels online). Prior to January 27th, 2013, that same 1 ounce package would cost \$3.15 to send to Canada; .15 cents for each additional ounce. This is a 108% increase!

Prior to this most recent increase, I was paying \$1.50-\$1.75 to send a 1 ounce package to Canada in the summer of 2011. All totaled, this is a <u>436% increase in shipping to Canada</u> alone over the last 2 years! I will not even attempt to analyze the cost to Europe, but that is not pretty either.

3) When you talk about cost, we have to add into this the price of new product releases. Regardless of the sport(s) you collect, this hobby is not cheap and does require some disposable income in order to purchase packs, boxes or cases. A couple of examples of how costs can play a part in people not having the available coin in order to open something are with the cost of products such as The Cup and Bowman Jumbo.

In 2007-08, I was paying \$300/USD for a tin of The Cup locally in the Buffalo area. Now, that similar 5-6 card tin of The Cup is closer to \$500/USD per tin! A 66% increase in the retail price and zero guarantee that the cards that you potentially will have 66% more value in trading.

The second example has to do with the cost of Bowman Baseball, specifically the Jumbo (HTA) boxes (although you can trace the cost of hobby packs as well) seems to always jump in price after the initial release. Currently, you cannot find a box of Bowman Jumbos for less than \$210/USD. The initial price for this same product was around \$160-\$170/USD a box. It is not as a severe change in price as it just discussed with The Cup, but a 20% variance has an impact to a potential buyer, especially if they do not see the value in the product. Because there seems to be fewer products being opened by the average collector, it lends to people having less inventory to potentially trade/sell.

4) Finally, we need to look at ourselves as collectors. Since the prices of most new products can be cost prohibitive for most members, people tend to think how the disposable income that we do have is spent on the hobby. Thus, I find that people look to other sources in getting their cards, such as via eBay, Sports Card Direct, COMC and other outlets in order to get the cards that they want for their collections without having to break the bank.

This is actually a smart option for the majority of collectors; it helps to minimize their costs, while staying active in the hobby.



I think that a combination of all 4 points are contributing to the decline of trading that is done on SCF, especially when you combine all of the points relating to cost. Is there something that can be done to remedy this? I'm not 100% sure what can be done, short of a change in SCF policy to allow for in-person trading to be counted toward completed trades (Rule 6.14).

I understand the complications of allowing for in-person trading to be allowed, including manipulation of an individual feedback score. However, if SCF were to partner with local hobby shops to allow members to count a single trade from that trade night toward their feedback score, it would could actually generate more interest in SCF and also start to potentially see an upswing of the more "traditional" type of online trading.

Ask yourself this question, does it really matters how or where the trade is made? If the deal is made at SCF or at an SCF sanctioned event, it should count.

These are the issues that I can see from my vantage point.





The Lions of Winter Triumphant – Hockey's Greatest Champions By Richard McAdam aka RGM81

When the topic of the greatest championship team in the history of our favourite sports was raised by the editor of this fine magazine, my response to her was simply, "Should I write about the Habs dynasty that won five straight Stanley Cups or just the 1976-77 Canadiens?" Obviously there is a bit of a bias involved coming from this writer to favour *le bleu-blanc-rouge* in this type of discussion, but the facts speak for themselves when it comes to the subject. The Canadiens dynasties of the 1950s to the 1970s had some of the greatest players in the history of the game, and what defined their greatness were not merely their individual prowess but their ability to consistently win at the highest levels of competition.

There were, in reality, three different dynasties in Montreal—the teams of the late 50s and the decade of the 70s are more prominent, but so often overlooked is the Habs squad of the 1960's that very nearly won five straight championships, thwarted only by the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1967. Much as it seems surreal that a 60-goal scorer like Steve Shutt is often overlooked in discussions of individual Canadiens greatness, so too is it odd that the Canadiens of the 1960's are referred to as the "forgotten dynasty" in the team's history. This is what makes it so difficult to say which Championship edition of the Habs stands the test of time as the greatest ever.



This is not to suggest that there aren't other teams whose championship resumes aren't worthy of mention, far from it. The great teams of the New York Islanders of the early 1980's, the Oilers throughout that decade, or the Detroit Red Wings of the late 1990's could all put forward candidates that would merit serious discussion. Those teams were the class of the NHL in their period. The likes of Trottier/Bossy/Gilles or Gretzky/Messier/Kurri formed the offensive core of teams with explosive firepower, while the allaround excellence of the Red Wings under the leadership of Steve Yzerman gets those clubs into the discussion. But while those teams did enjoy considerable success and deserve numerous platitudes, there is still one club that stands above all the others: the Club de Hockey Canadien of 1959-60.

For this writer, the decision really did come down to the team that won the last of five straight Cups or the team of 76-77 that steamrolled the entire NHL en route to its second of four straight titles. You could make the argument for either side, really, and not be wrong. The latter was a team that lost only 8 regular season games and 2 post-season games. The backup goalie, Michel Larocque, had more wins (19) than the Detroit Red Wings (16) in the regular season. The club lost one game after January 17th. Larry Robinson finished the season an astonishing +120 while finishing 3rd in team scoring with 85 points. Guy Lafleur scored 56 goals and won the Art Ross Trophy. Ken Dryden's GAA of 1.55 and 4 shutouts in 14 post season games were just a symptom of his excellence. Truly, this was a powerhouse club that was hell-bent on not just winning, but demonstrating that they were the best ever. Many younger Canadiens fans and hockey people in general will point to this team as the greatest ever, and with the evidence above it's not hard to see why.


However, what makes the 1959-60 Canadiens just a slight cut above the rest is that it was the peak of the era of the Flying Frenchmen. When one looks at the Canadiens as a cultural icon in the province of Quebec, it is this team that



defines that lofty status. Far removed from the era in which the team would have to decide between "being French, or being successful" as explained by Ken Dryden in his fantastic tome, *The Game*, the Canadiens of their first great dynasty were successful *and* French simultaneously. The list of names on that team: Maurice Richard, Jean Beliveau, Henri Richard, Jacques Plante, Marcel Bonin, Boom Boom Geoffrion, Jean-Guy Talbot, Claude Provost, Andre Pronovost, and on and on represented the plateau of Frank Selke's work to build a powerhouse team with homegrown and developed talent. When one thinks of the standard of excellence set by the Canadiens, and the ongoing desire to do it in a fashion that has that unique French Canadian quality to it, it is because of this great dynasty.

In the six-team NHL of the era, the Canadiens were dominant – this season was the 10th consecutive year that the team would make an appearance in the Cup Finals – and stood considerably higher in the standings than the other Original Six clubs. That year, the Canadiens finished first overall, their 92 points a 13-point lead over the second place Maple Leafs. The team leader in scoring that year was Jean Beliveau, who was in his element with 34 goals and 40 assists, good for 74 points, one more than Maurice's younger brother Henri, who was emerging as a dynamic offensive weapon for the team.

This was truly a team of superstars. Of the 23 men on the roster of the 1959-60 Canadiens, seven have had their numbers retired by the team. Nine (including coach Toe Blake) are in the Hockey Hall of Fame. Many of these players had been around for all of the previous four years of championship seasons, and knowing that Richard was retiring, they were all determined to win a fifth consecutive Cup. Many of them would go on to win many more Cups on the next great dynasty —by the end of their careers, Jean Beliveau and Henri Richard would both see their names on that great trophy more than 10 times, and play central roles in all of them.



Ever since the infamous suspension of Maurice Richard in 1955, which cost him the scoring title and deprived the Canadiens of their captain and best player, The Rocket was a man possessed. Though he didn't have the same scoring touch of his prime years he was nevertheless the ultimate competitor, primed to win and focused solely on championships. Indeed, following his return from that suspension, the Canadiens never lost the Stanley Cup with Maurice on the roster. In his final season, Richard was more of an inspiration than a top-line contributor, finishing with 19 goals and adding 16 assists. He scored only once in the playoffs, in Game 3 of the Finals against Toronto.

The playoffs were a victory march for the Canadiens. They were, in a word, unbeatable. Literally. The Habs did not lose a single game in the 1960 post-season, sweeping both Chicago and Toronto, usually winning the games by significant margins. In the eight games played, Jacques Plante had three shutouts, while the offence provided four or more goals on six occasions. There was absolutely no doubt about the Canadiens success, no margin for the vanquished to have claimed that with a couple bounces things may have gone their way. That is a key

factor in establishing a truly great Cup Champion from a team that emerged victorious after scratching and clawing their



way through the playoffs. The Habs crushed their opponents. No drama. No nail-biting. No possibility of the series turning or slipping away at any point. Just winning.

What follows is an excerpt from the book *Lions in Winter*, written by Allan Turowetz and Chrys Goyens, on the subject of how close that Canadiens dynasty was to actually winning three more championships, and of course the idea being turned on its head:


If Canadiens fans could change history with a deflection here, a judicious referee's ruling there, could not the same imaginary happenstance have befallen them with unfortunate results during their fable five-year run? Not quite. In those five years, Montreal was taken to a sixth game final only once (1957-58) winning three of the finals in five games and the other in four. That left little room for the fortuitous circumstance of a deflected puck or disallowed goal.

This gives the reader an idea of just how dominant that team was, the prodigious work of Frank Selke after his arrival in



Montreal to turn a moribund franchise into the greatest dynasty in hockey history. The cast of all-star players, the supporting cast, the coaching, the developmental system, all of it was his product. In 1959-60, it was the pinnacle of excellence. When the fans of the Canadiens were asked in 1984 to select the club's all-time roster, five of the spots were reserved for players on the 1959-60 team: Richard, Beliveau, Dickie Moore, Doug Harvey, and Plante (the other was Larry Robinson). During the team's Centennial celebrations in 2009, Richard, Beliveau, and Harvey retained those positions—some goalie named Roy bumped Plante while Moore slipped down to fifth. The championship record, which will never be equalled, was a fitting way for the greatest player in Canadiens history to retire. The perfect opportunity to pass the torch on to Jean Beliveau. For Selke himself, who would be forced into retirement by Molson's policies, he could be fully confident in turning over the reins of the team to Sam Pollock, who would go on to carve out his own legacy in Habs lore.

Truly, there is no team on a par with the 1959-60 Canadiens. The greatest dynasty in its greatest season, there is no higher accolade for the club to earn.

The Hendrick Motorsports Dynasty By Stephen Taylor aka race crazy

A dynasty in sports never starts out easy nor does it continue down the path of likewise travel. It is tested with events, hardships, and failures only to rise back up to its perch of dominance. Often a dynasty is created by a great player-a Bill Russell, a Michael Jordan, or a great coach: Dean Smith, Red Auerbach, Phil Jackson, Bill Walsh, John Wooden. In auto racing, the driver and crew chief combination act as the player and coach with the pit crew and engineers being the supporting cast of players to make a successful team. However in auto

racing, the car owner is the overseer and the creator of the dynasty. He supplies the necessary means and organization for his assembled talent to succeed. In racing an owner does not sit in his luxury box away from the action, he is often integrated in it. Many current car owners have been highly successful and had their own runs at a so-called dynasty but only one man has the right to lay claim to that over the last 25 years of the sport, and that man is Rick Hendrick.

A Chevy man who was becoming successful in the car business in the early 1980s, Hendrick decided to go racing and follow his dream. A driver himself for some time Hendrick soon realized his strength was in people and organization and not driving racecars. A small team called All Star Racing was formed. Struggles soon followed. Going into the Martinsville race of 1984 Hendrick was about ready to fold up shop and move on from his dream. Then driver Geoff Bodine and crew chief Harry Hyde pulled off an upset win for the upstart team, a sponsor was found, and as they say the rest is history.

Over the next decade Hendrick would slowly ascend to the top of the sport. His talent for finding the right people and sponsors in order to become successful is what would propel him. Every year Hendrick's pool of talent got greater. Drivers like Tim Richmond, Darrell Waltrip, Ken Schrader, Terry Labonte, and Ricky Rudd would all help grow the team considerably. As of 1993 however Hendrick still had no championships in Nascar's elite series to show for his hard work. Hendrick would assemble an upstart team in 1993 under the guidance of an engineering mind in crew chief Ray Evernham. His driver would be young gun Jeff Gordon, who had torn up the Nascar Busch Series the year before. Right out of the gate the duo were fast but also young. Gordon was prone to mistakes but as they say in racing you cannot teach speed. By 1994 the young team was ready for their breakout.

Dale Earnhardt was entering 1994 as a six-time Cup champion and the best driver in the series. He knew along with most of the sport that the young Gordon was soon going to be a pain in his quest for more. Earnhardt prevailed in 1994

for his 7th title, but Gordon was hot on his heels having won his first two career races-the Coca Cola 600 and the inaugural Brickyard 400 at Indianapolis. By 1995 there was a new team on top of the heap.

Rick Hendrick would watch in 1995 as his young team dethroned Earnhardt for their first championship. In 1996 Gordon would be beaten by veteran Hendrick teammate Terry Labonte for the title. In 1997 and 1998 Gordon and the 24 team were unbeatable. Hendrick motorsports dominated the sport in a route of the titles.

However as most dynasties do Hendrick would endure some down years. Ray Evernham would leave to start a program for Dodge, breaking up the chemistry of Hendrick's team. Although Gordon won a title in 2001 Hendrick endured a few down years.

n 2002 Hendrick would bring a new driver into the fold named Jimmie Johnson and pair him with a crew chief who had trained under Ray Evernham, one Chad Knaus. Hendrick's pairing proved hugely successful with many race victories. The ascension to the top was back on when tragedy would strike the team. In October of 2004 Johnson would win the race at Martinsville only to learn that 10 members of the Hendrick Motorsports family had perished in a plane crash en route to the track. Rick Hendrick's friends and relatives were among those lost, most notably his son Ricky who was following his father's business having won the Busch Series title in 2003 with Brian Vickers after retiring from driving. Hendrick Motorsports would go on to race and win the next week at Atlanta in a highly emotional affair but the title eluded them.

By 2005 it had been 4 years since a championship for Rick Hendrick. His teams came out of the gate strong with Jeff Gordon winning the Daytona 500. Gordon and Johnson battled all year for the title but when it came down to it they again fell short. Tension was high and the Johnson/Knaus pairing was in dire straits. Only Hendrick's ability to organize and manage people kept the successful duo together. By 2006 the dynasty was on the verge of massive success.

For the next 5 years Johnson, Knaus, and Hendrick Motorsports would make a mockery of the competition winning 5 consecutive titles. No one had ever won more than 3 straight. Johnson would fall just short in 2011 and 2012 but he remains the most successful driver on the grid today in most categories. Hendrick's driver line-up of Johnson, Gordon, Dale Earnhardt Jr., and Kasey Kahne is among the strongest in the sport. Hendrick has garnered the fame and fortune from his success but also endured the hardships of life along the way. There is no doubt however that he is the dynasty. He is for drivers want to drive for and people want to work for. The ability to be the best is shown continually. Hendrick Motorsports is a sporting dynasty.

The modern day campus of Hendrick Motorsports is on par with a highly funded college

Coach of the Year - George Karl. Karl led the Nuggets to a 57-25 record including an amazing 38-3 record at home. The team was extremely young with an average age of less than twenty five years old. The team also lacked a superstar and had no player score more than 17 points a game.

The NFL's Best Squad By J.R. Lebert aka jrlebert

When it comes to whittling down the best teams in NFL history, or at least the Super Bowl Era (1966-present), certain criteria must be met, at least for this particular author. My guidelines are as follows:

- 1. You must be a Super Bowl winner. (Simple enough)
- 2. You must have had two or fewer losses over the course of the season
- 3. Your team must have ranked in the NFL top 5 in total offense and defense (points/allowed, yards/ allowed, or both)
- 4. Iconic players and coaches are a plus

With these as the factors, my apologies to the 1976 Raiders, 1986 Giants, 1998 Broncos, and Tom Brady's 2003 squad. I also chose to omit the 1984 49ers and the 2004 Patriots, as they fall short in stature to teams from their same era (1989 49ers and 2007 Patriots, respectively). The 1991 Redskins also come up short, based on a lack of HOF depth, with just Darrell Green, Russ Grimm, and Art Monk on the register, and a so-so quarterback, Mark Rypien. So without further ado, here are my picks for the 5 greatest franchises in NFL history.

5. 1989 San Francisco 49ers (17-2)

Any team that has the combination of Joe Montana and Jerry Rice is formidable from the start. Adding in a defense that

was in the top 5 in both yards and points allowed is what helped push this team over the top and in the top 5 ever. True, they had an equally great 1984 team, but this roster gets the nod based on two things: the addition of the G.O.A.T., Jerry Rice, and depth at QB and on offense.


The offense, of course, starts at QB, and the 1989 49ers had the best in the business. Montana was named NFL MVP, Offensive POY, and also took home the Super Bowl MVP. When he went down with an injury for 3 games, the team didn't miss a beat. HOFer Steve Young took the helm, passed for over 1,000 yards, and led the team to a 3-0 record. Aside from Jerry Rice's eye-popping line of 82-1483-17, leading the league in the latter two categories, he was buoyed by talented veterans Brent Jones, Roger Craig, John Taylor, and OL Guy McIntyre. The defense is where the team loses a few points, as just one player has gained election to the HOF as of 2013, safety Ronnie Lott. DE Charles Haley has a great shot at induction, but after them, the defense leaves a bit to be desired. This team also has the "least iconic" coach of the 5 on this list. George Seifert although h

also has the "least iconic" coach of the 5 on this list, George Seifert, although he remains the franchise leader in victories.

4. 1978 Pittsburgh Steelers (17-2)

Though their defense comes with a vaunted title, The Steel Curtain, the defense lacked the dominance on the stat sheet to push it further towards the top all-time. Couple that with an offense that was just near, not at, the top in 1978, and a QB who's legacy far outshines his stat line, and the greatest squad in Steelers history sits at #4.

The offense only scored the 5th most points, and racked up the 8th most yards, in 1978. This would prove to be Terry Bradshaw's finest season as a pro, throwing a career-high 28 TDs, most of which went to his HOF receiving duo of







Lynn Swann and John Stallworth, while winning the AP MVP and Super Bowl MVP awards. Fellow HOFer Franco Harris racked up over 1,000 yards on the ground, and C Mike Webster, one of the greatest ever at his position, anchored the line.

Though the defense led the league in points allowed, this would prove to be the only category they would rank first in. The defense was chock full of HOFers on each level. DB Mel Blount led the secondary, while a pair of Canton-bound LBs shared the backfield and a common first name, Jack Ham, and Jack Lambert. D-lineman L.C. Greenwood and "Mean" Joe Greene led the rush to the quarterback, but despite the dominating name and reputation, they failed to shut out an opponent all season. They do gain extra points for a HOF coach in Chuck Noll.

3. 1966 Green Bay Packers (14-2)

The winners of the very first Super Bowl have stood the test of time, and rank as one of the all-time best teams, almost 50 years since their win. They were the NFL's signature franchise in the 1960's, winning the NFL Championship or Super Bowl 5 times in 7 years, spanning 1961-1967. Each one of those victories was coached by the iconic Vince Lombardi, and led on the field by the equally-iconic QB Bart Starr. Starr would take home the AP MVP, Super Bowl

MVP, and his only AP 1st Team selection in 1966. The offense also featured HOF FB Jim Taylor and HB Paul Hornung, who would make 1966 his final season. HOFer Forrest Gregg, and possible future HOFer Jerry Kramer anchored the offensive line, while Carroll Dale, one of the great early TE's and another possible future HOFer, hauled in the passes.

On defense, the roster reads like a who's who of the Hall of Fame. There were two HOFers at each level, with DBs Willie Wood and Herb Adderley, LBs Ray Nitschke and Dave Robinson, and linemen Henry Jordan and Willie Davis all looking to make plays. This team may have played in another era, but they would do just fine in the modern game.

2. 1972 Miami Dolphins (17-0)

It seems almost blasphemous to have the only undefeated team in NFL history at #2, but it's not without reason. The offense was very good, leading the NFL in points scored and yards gained, as well as rushing yards and touchdowns rushing. There isn't one galvanizing star on offense, however, to pull it all together. True, Bob Greise would go on to a HOF career, but he started just 5 games for the Phins that season, and threw as many picks as TDs. The line was led by two other HOFers, C Jim Langer and G Larry Little, and WR Paul Warfield caught the passes. The "star" of the offense in 1972 was FB Larry Csonka, who gained a career high 1,117 yards on the ground, en route to Miami outrushing opponents by over 1,400 yards.



Just one HOFer started on defense for Miami, MLB Nick Buoniconti, although a definite case can be made for SB MVP

Jake Scott to have a bust at Canton. The defense pitched three shutouts, and led the NFL in points, yards, and first downs allowed. One of the great coaches, Don Shula, guided this bunch to their undefeated record, but not to the top spot all-time. That spot belongs to...

1. 1985 Chicago Bears (17-1)

The 1985 Chicago Bears had it all: Talent, skill, and most of all, swagger. Hall of Famers lined the roster, especially on the defensive end. Arguably the greatest running back ever was in the backfield. A pair of larger-than-life egos led the way, with one quarterbacking the team, and the other providing its signature moment. But above all, there was the Shuffle... the Super Bowl Shuffle.

Though the offense scored just the second most points in 1985, its rushing attack was number one. The Bears led the NFL with 2,761 yards on the ground, and 27 TDs, led by "Sweetness", Walter Payton, who piled up 1,551 yards rushing and another 483 receiving, en route to 11 TDs. None of Payton's 400+ carries would be as memorable as another by a rookie in the Super Bowl, but more on that below. Brash QB Jim McMahon led the passing attack, and though he only started 11 games in 1985, the team won every single one of them.

It was the Bears defense that set them apart from all comers. They led the defense in points, yards, and first downs allowed, interceptions, turnovers, and rushing yards and scores allowed, as well as point differential. They had the Defensive Player of the Year, Mike Singletary, and appropriately, the Super Bowl MVP, Richard Dent. Chicago recorded 6 shutouts, including two in the playoffs, and forced 5+ turnovers six times in 18 games, with a defense led by

HOFers Singletary, Dent, and Dan Hampton, as well as AP 1st Team selection Steve McMichael.

The Monsters of the Midway were never better than when it counted most, plowing through their 3 playoff games like never before. Their first two playoff games resulted in shutouts, by a combined score of 45-0. Their yards allowed per game decreased in each of their three playoff games, culminating in an absolute beat down of the New England Patriots in the Super Bowl, 46-10, which ran their playoff scoring to 91 points. In that game, they forced 6 turnovers, sacked the QB seven times, once for a safety, and allowed exactly seven yards rushing. The team's memorable moment came in

the 3rd quarter, when rookie DT William "The Refrigerator" Perry plunged one yard into the end zone for a score, putting the Bears up 44-3. This team was able to make good on their promise three months earlier, they recorded the Super Bowl Shuffle. Add in that this team was coached by the legendary Mike Ditka, and you have the makings of the best team to ever play in the NFL.





On the Diamond

Baseball's Best Team By J. R. Lebert aka jrlebert

There are certain topics in baseball that will spark heated debate. Best player ever. Best player at their position. Most dominant run. Best single play. Best single game. Perhaps no topic, however, is as highly debated as the best single team of all time. For one year, what team was the most dominant? Who had the most feared lineup, combined with the best pitching? Who ran through their season on the way to a World Series title?

To attempt to answer this debate, I have come up with four simple criteria for determining the greatest team of all-time:

1. You must have won at least 105 games.

Only 24 teams have ever won as many as 105 games in a single season. What makes this even more remarkable is that some of the teams on this list played in fewer than the 162-game season we have now!

2. You must have won the World Series that year.

Winning the World Series is an absolute must. That eliminates some great teams, including the two teams that won more games in the regular season than any others in history, the 2001 Mariners and 1906 Chicago Cubs. Also falling off the list are the 1953 Cleveland Indians and the pitching-laden 1998 Atlanta Braves. From that list of 24, we whittle it down to just 13 teams.

3. Your lineup must have names that will stand the test of time.

When naming your team's roster 20, 50, or even 100 years after, even casual fans should be able to say, "Hey, those guys are good!" This cuts our list down even further. The 1905 New York Giants did have Christy Mathewson, but other than him, odds are the team's most famous player is Archibald "Moonlight" Graham, made famous in the movie Field of Dreams. This also cuts the 1909 Pittsburgh Pirates. Most know of Honus Wagner, if not for his play then for his famous tobacco card, but few outside of baseball have heard of the other two HOFers on the team, Vic Willis and Fred Clarke. This also sheds the 1912 Boston Red Sox, 1942 and 1944 St. Louis Cardinals, and, unfortunately for this particular writer, the 1986 New York Mets. This leaves us with 7 teams, and right here is where the going gets tough.

4. Your team must have prolonged success, and must be the most dominant franchise of its era While we are only judging single seasons, having teams that are dominant over a period of time tends to lend more credence to how dominant, how absolutely great the best team in that era was. This actually eliminates the 1970 Baltimore Orioles. Despite their run of three World Series appearances in a row, they won just won, and lost in 1969 and 1971 as heavy favorites. Also, over that run of success, this team must be "best" or "most dominant" of their era, so that eliminates the 1907 Chicago Cubs, and their HOF infield of Tinker, Evers, and Chance. Just one year earlier, the Cubs had won 116 games, but lost in the World Series. This also jettisons the 1975 Cincinnati Reds. Their 1976 version led the league in almost every offensive category, and despite winning fewer games, seems to be the better of the two "Big Red Machine" teams. And then there were five…

Here are the five teams remaining. There may be a pattern.

1927 New York Yankees. 1932 New York Yankees. 1961 New York Yankees. 1961 New York Yankees. 1998 New York Yankees.



That's right, 5 different Yankees squads, spanning several eras, are this author's choice for who the top 5 teams of alltime are. While we are splitting hairs over which team is best, that *is* the point of the article, so here is how I rank them:

5. 1998 Yankees.

The team with the most regular season wins of any World Series team also ranks as easily the best Yankees squad in 50+ years. The team has three certain HOFers in SS Derek Jeter, closer Mariano Rivera, and manager Joe Torre. Andy Pettitte and Jorge Posada were dominant at their positions for over a decade, and, along with Bernie Williams, are considered borderline HOF candidates, at worst. The team dominated bad teams, going 21-1 vs. Kansas City and Tampa Bay, combined. They won their division by 22 games. Their postseason record was 11-2, and Rivera had the greatest performance by a reliever in World Series history, saving 3 of the four wins to go with his ERA of... zero.

4. 1939 Yankees.

The 1939 team was in the midst of an unprecedented run, even by Yankees standards. They would win the World Series in four consecutive years, from 1936-39, and again in 1941 and 1943. The 1939 year was their best roster, despite it being the last time Lou Gehrig would ever put on pinstripes. They were led by Joe DiMaggio, the 1939 MVP and MLB leader in average at .381. Hall of Famers dotted the roster, including C Bill Dickey, 2B Joe Gordon, and pitchers Red Ruffing and Lefty Gomez. They actually won more games on the road (54) than at home (52), and won 9 more games total than any other team in 1939. They scored an amazing 411 runs more than their opposition, and swept the Reds in the World Series.

3. 1932 Yankees.

The 1932 Yankees are a bit of an exception, and a victim, somewhat, of the greatness of another squad a little further



down the list. They are the second team from the same era, but for good reason. This team was an offensive juggernaut, scoring over 1000 runs, and was never shut out during the entire season! They were an incredible 62-15 at home, but actually scored more runs on the road. Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth were their typical incredible selves, as both finished in the top 6 in the MVP race. Hall of Famers Joe Sewell, Tony Lazzeri, Earle Combs and Bill Dickey rounded out the offense, while a Hall of Fame trio of Lefty Gomez, Red Ruffing, and Herb Pennock manned the mound. There would be another Yankees team from this era, however, that would prove to deserve top billing...

2. 1961 Yankees.

From 1955 through 1964, no team was as consistently great as the Bronx Bombers. They played in 9 World Series, winning four, and their best team from that incredible run was easily this 1961 squad. Of course, the 1961 season will forever be remembered as the season in which Babe Ruth's mighty home run record of 60 fell, but not to the odds on favorite, Mickey Mantle. No, while Mickey *did* hit a career high 54 dingers in 1961, he would finish second in both the home run race and the MVP vote to Roger

Maris, who pounded out 61 home runs, 141 RBI, and scored 132 runs. Whitey Ford was the Cy Young Award winner, winning 25 games, a career best, against just 4 losses. It was a combination of career years for these 1961 Yankees that made the roster so formidable. They had a powerhouse two-headed monster at catcher, with All-Star Elston Howard



and Johnny Blanchard combining for 42 HRs and 131 RBI. 1B Moose Skowron notched a career high in HR with 28, and SS Tony Kubek netted career bests in hits, doubles, and runs scored, with both infielders making the All-Star squad. Throw in fellow All-Stars Luis Arroyo, their closer who led MLB in saves, and HOFer Yogi Berra in the outfield, and this roster ranks up there with the all-time best.

1. 1927 Yankees.

The 1927 Yankees never spent one day out of first place for the entire season. Not one. They outscored opponents by 376 runs. The finished 1927 with a 21-1 record vs. the St. Louis Browns. They swept the World Series. And not one of these facts even begins to tell of the greatness of the most feared batting order in MLB history.

The lineup was called Murderer's Row. While they were a bit below average at SS, 3B, and C, their OF performance ranks as one of the best ever. The trio of Bob Muesel, HOFer Earle Combs, and Babe Ruth combined to hit .350 and collect 597 hits. This would be the season Ruth would establish the record for HR's in a season, with 60, to go with 158 runs scored, 164 RBIs, and a .356 average. Lou Gehrig would one up Ruth in average (.373) and RBI (175), and would lead the majors with 52 doubles and 447 total bases on the way to the 1927 MVP. HOFer Tony Lazzeri patrolled second base.

The Yankees scored 130 more runs than any team in baseball, gave up 20 fewer runs, and won 16 more games than any other team in 1927. They led all of baseball in runs, home runs, average, and team ERA, and led their league in hits. On their roster was the 1927 MLB leader in games, doubles, RBI, total bases, runs, home runs, walks, OBP, slugging, OPS+, at bats, plate appearances, triples, ERA, saves, ERA+, and hits/9 innings.

They had the best closer in the game in rookie Wilcy Moore, who had 19 wins to go with his MLB best 13 saves. They had two HOFers at the top of the rotation, with Waite Hoyt, a 22 game winner that year, and Herb Pennock, who won 19. One of their weakest hitters, SS Mark Koenig, went 9 for 18 (.500 average) in the World Series. Heck, even their manager, Miller Huggins, is in the Hall of Fame.

It's hard to argue, but fun to debate, that the 1927 Yankees are baseball's greatest team ever assembled.

Card Karma By Mason Hermann aka antropov14

Two years ago, I sustained an injury that required back surgery to correct it. While recovering in Sick Kids Hospital in Toronto at the age of 14, after surgery, a children's clown entertainer came along with his bag of tricks to keep patients' spirits up, and provide a distraction to the situation at hand. As I was on the older end of patients, I normally wouldn't be entertained by watching a clown, but I was tired and sore, and this was definitely a great way to pass some time. Furthermore, only about five days later I would discover just how important this clown really turned out to be, and the lesson he taught I will remember forever.

The clown came in and did the usual routine, a few jokes, tricks, and put on a little act, but seeing that I was older than most, he had something special up his sleeve for me. I was astounded even in my sleepy state to see him pull out a deck of hockey cards from his bag of tricks and a roll of tape. Now fully attentive, I watched as he showed me how to make a simple wallet out of six cards and clear packaging tape. He let me choose my favourite six cards that he had, and helped me tape it up (the IV in each hand made this a little difficult for me). I was so thrilled at what had just happened I ended up remembering about some hockey cards that I had brought to the hospital from home.

Before I left for Toronto, I ended up going through my collection and sorting out about 150 base and insert cards and packaging them up in groups of 10-12 cards and putting them in my suitcase. I was planning to give them to a patient in a waiting room, or donate them to give out to other children who were to come in the future. I knew this was the perfect opportunity for me to give back and I knew this was a sign. I asked for someone to get the cards from my bag and give them to the clown. He accepted them graciously and was thrilled to add to his stock so that many other kids could be making wallets with him on his rounds in the hospital.

He absolutely made my day, and I know that I also made his. I felt overjoyed at how perfectly this opportunity was presented, and I couldn't have asked for a better outcome.

The real significance and lesson truly comes full circle a few days later, on the way home from Toronto. After staying in hospital for three days, and in a hotel for a few more, I was feeling ready for the car trip home. I had been regularly making small trips around the hotel with my walker, building up my strength again little by little each day. We departed in the morning and proceeded to make our trip home.



Along the way, I knew of a card shop that I had never visited before and I was feeling strong enough to stop in for a few minutes and get moving to stretch my back and legs. Prior to the surgery, I had not been out of the house for two weeks so as not to get sick, as then the surgery would have been cancelled. I was excited to see something new and different. The shop owner was astounded to see how eager I was, even in my condition to be looking around and searching through some cards. After a little time chatting and the purchase of a Rick DiPietro pad save card from ITG (still one of my favorite cards to date) and one pack of SP Authentic, I was ready to get back in the car and head home. I said goodbye to the owner and turned for my walker and was heading out when he called me back.

To my astonishment, he reached down to a stack of 2008-09 UD Series Two





boxes (the full 24 packs), and handed me one. I was speechless. It was a genuine gesture and an extremely generous one at that. I thanked him profusely and then we continued home.

Only later in discussion did the idea hit me. It was only days prior that I had myself given away some cards as a genuine gesture of kindness, and karma was repaying me back. It was the only good reason I could think of. I had only spent \$15 on the pack and card I bought, and the owner ended up giving me a box worth \$40 just like that. I truly see what people mean by karma and I know that even the smallest contributions and kindness will go a long way. This really was an eye opener for me, and it stood out so clearly that I know I will never forget this collecting story. I had a great trip home from there, opening my box in the car, and being thrilled when I pulled a Shanahan jersey card. I still have that card in my collection today, and I will always have that story with me forever.

How to Collect on a Budget By Ryan Kalmoe aka SWOWannabe

If you're at all like me and the vast majority of collectors, the only zeros in your checking account balance is what it shows after you've paid your bills for the month. It can be a very difficult to manage your finances, especially with a family. Every expert will agree, however, that the age-old adage "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy" holds true in every regard – if at all possible we should have some sort of entertainment budget each month. The problem is that because it's more fun to buy baseball cards than pay insurance premiums, it can be all too easy to overspend on our favorite hobby which can lead to stress and other negative consequences in other aspects of our lives. I'm here to share with you several of my strategies and secrets to enjoying the hobby on a budget. You're certainly welcome to try any and all of them yourself. With a little patience, a little work, and a little luck, you can see your collection grow without seeing your wallet shrink!

Contests

The first area many people miss out on is the opportunity to win free cards from contests. Contests are held daily in some form throughout the collecting world. Topps frequently holds contests on Twitter, along with several other independent sources. Panini usually has at least one contest a week on their blog. There are contests right here on Sports Card Forum that you can enter. The amount of work required varies, as do the rewards. Topps and Panini, for example, give away memorabilia and autographed cards alongside entire boxes of product. Other contests may have a single card up for grabs, and most commonly here on SCF you can win Card Cash. Check your local card shop, too, as many of them run contests at varying intervals with prizes. My old card shop had a bonus lottery-style drawing at the end of each month for an assortment of packs. My current card shop has Pack Wars on a monthly basis where you can win a wide range of prizes. This month there is an unopened 2012 Black Friday promotional pack, a John Kerry cut autograph, and several other excellent prizes to be won.

Now, entering contests may seem like common sense. However, most people do not enter these contests. Let me reiterate – most people DO NOT ENTER. They dismiss the contest as too much work, or why bother if it is an easy contest because they'll never win? I can't guarantee that you will win if you enter. I *can* guarantee that you **will not win** if you do not enter. I've had varying degrees of success with contests in my short two years of collecting. My best win was a 2012 Elite autograph of Ryan Tannehill with a twist – it was a personal edition of the card unavailable in packs. I've since traded the card for baseball cards, since I don't collect football cards.

This brings me to another point about contests. Just because the prize isn't up your alley doesn't mean you shouldn't enter. I'll enter contests for football, basketball, hockey, even soccer and golf cards. If you manage to win, someone somewhere will likely want the card and you'll be able to trade it for something you *do* collect, or you can sell it to them in an absolute worst-case scenario. You may think it isn't fair to be 'stealing' these sports cards from hobbyists that actually collect that sport. It is a noble thought, but I view myself more as a general sports card collector than just a baseball card collector. Besides, there are plenty of people that collect

more than one sport and it never hurts to have more than just your primary sport to expand the number of hobbyists you're able to trade with.

Contests are the first and easiest way to make your collecting budget go farther. They're hopefully free to enter, and if you enter enough of them you're bound to win eventually. Perseverance is key. Don't get discouraged after a few (or even more than a few) contests that you don't win. While you mathematically can win them all, it is highly unlikely that you will win even the majority of them. Just be excited when you do win and keep entering!

Free Money

Wait, what? Free money? Yes, if you're on a cardboard budget there are ways to drum up extra revenue without doing much more than your daily activities. You could apply this to any aspect of your life – groceries, clothing, etc. I choose to use the extra money on baseball cards. Most of the extra revenue comes in the form of gift cards to various locations – Amazon.com, Target, etc. If you're on a strict \$20 a month budget for baseball cards, coming up with an extra \$200 a year in gift cards through various programs can really expand your collection in a hurry.

One way to earn these gift cards are through certain **reputable** sites that essentially pay you to be a consumer. There are two that I use and can attest to their legitimacy. Bing.com and Swagbucks both have rewards programs for using their search engines. You won't see instant gratification with them, but with a little bit of presence and perseverance, you can very easily earn a \$5 Amazon gift card each month from those sites. There is the potential to earn much more, but it depends on the amount of effort you put forth. There are other rewards available on Swagbucks, namely Paypal. Who doesn't love Paypal? To date I have personally earned over \$300 in absolutely 100% free gift cards between these two sites. Some months I put a lot of effort into earning more gift cards while other months I've done next to nothing. The sites themselves are fairly self-explanatory as to how to earn their points and how to redeem the points for gift cards. If you're curious how they can do that, they have sponsors that pay them to target advertisements at consumers like you and I. Instead of keeping that revenue for themselves, they share it amongst their users to attract users in the first place. So it is up to you if you want to line Google's pockets or your own for using the internet.

If you're fortunate enough to have a Smartphone, there are a few Apps that will let you earn free gift cards. They vary depending on the platform you are on, but the three that I use on my Android are Shopkicks, Checkpoints, and Nielsen Mobile Rewards. Shopkicks and Checkpoints are apps that will give you points for walking into certain stores with the option to scan items with your smart phone for additional points. Again, it is targeted advertisement with revenue sharing. If you're going to Target anyways, why not earn some gift cards while you're at it? Nielsen Mobile Rewards is another animal altogether. By downloading the program you're consenting to let Nielsen's application collect data on your phone usage for use in their research. If you're not comfortable with that, don't use the application. I'm a pretty easy-going guy and don't mind if someone is observing that I occasionally search the internet for a place to eat, use my map a lot because I get lost, and make about 1 phone call a month. Again ,it is up to you, but the program is a lot easier to use since it



just runs in the background and each month you get points as long as it remains installed on your phone. I'm closing in on redeeming for a \$50 Amazon gift card after roughly a year of use.

There are other rewards programs that can be used, I'm just sharing with you a few that I've found and have had success with. I've used one of my hotel loyalty programs to earn gift cards and I could use the points I earn for using my credit card each month. The opportunities are out there, and maybe you already do all of these things but choose to use your gift cards on something other than baseball cards. That's great. If you don't, consider looking into one or all of these programs and before you know it you'll be checking out at Target with a blaster of 2013 Allen and Ginter and having the cashier scan a gift card you just redeemed for on your phone. It is a pretty awesome feeling.

Budgeting

This one is by far the hardest. Finding a budget and sticking to it. It may be easy for some collectors and more difficult for others. A kid with an allowance each month is going to have a lot easier time sticking to his budget than an adult who could potentially spend a lot of money on cards but needs to practice self-restraint. Figure out what is a reasonable amount of money each month to spend on cards and stick to that. If you have problems sticking to that, consider either using only cash and setting aside a certain amount each month and



when it's gone it is gone, or setting up a completely separate checking account with a fixed amount allocated to it each month. I use a free online checking account that gets a small direct deposit each month. When it is gone, no more cards until next pay day! Also, it can help if you set a goal for yourself and save a portion of your budget each month. If your goal is to purchase a hobby box of a certain product, plan your budget out several months in advance, allocating a certain amount each month towards that box.

You can also look into selling some of your collection if you're looking for creative ways to stretch your budget. Don't buy cards thinking you're going to turn a profit, that's counter to the entire spirit of the hobby. However, if you are lucky enough to pull a nice autograph from a star player and

don't have anyone to trade it to, many people prefer to only deal with monetary transactions for cards. Since the money came from cards, it's only fair to me that I be allowed to put that back into the purchase of more cards. It isn't a strategy I use often, but if I find I have some higher value cards I have a problem trading, I'll just sell them to make it easier. Then I can go and purchase something that I may want.

Conclusion

So there you have it. This article is by no means the be all, end all of how to collect on a budget. But if you're like me and aren't fortunate enough to be able to afford a case of every new product that comes out, maybe you



can utilize some of these tips to pick up an extra blaster here or there, or win a free card from time to time. Often there isn't a significant time commitment, so you don't have a whole lot to lose, if anything. So give one or all of the aforementioned suggestions a try!*

We all know Bryce Harper is an absolute stud, and will be a large reason for the Nats' success. Inking Denard Span to a long-term deal will also be important, as good leadoff hitters are not as prevalent in the league as they once were. Washington will have to had some free-agent hitters though, as they do not possess many solid bats in the minor leagues aside from third-baseman Anthony Rendon. After trading Alex Meyer in the Denard Span deal during the offseason the Nats have also depleted the arms down on the farm. 2016 World Series Champion: Baltimore Orioles

A current roster that is brimming with young talent anchored by superstar sluggers Manny Machado and Adam Jones the future looks bright in Baltimore and they may put it together as early as 2014. Jones has improved his stat lines nearly every year and there is no reason to think that the now 27 year old will stop anytime soon. Finally Trevor May projects as an easy 2-3 starter for this staff and assuming some decent free-agent pickups this team could be scary good in 2017.

Don't Judge the Hobby by its Cover By Eric Fritz aka emfritz10

Ever since I was a young child, I was always enamored with the sport of basketball. Growing up in Indiana, this shouldn't come as much of a surprise. This is where the "Milan Miracle" took place, where Reggie Miller single-handedly brought New York to its knees, where Indiana University built its legacy, and Butler made two improbable NCAA runs. This is also where my love of basketball cards began in the late 1990s.

There has been a lot of talk about how the hobby has changed, especially in the past 15 years since I began collecting. The proliferation of game-used, ultra rare inserts/autos, and high-end products certainly has influenced a shift in the collecting demographic. My local hobby shop, once dominated by youth, is now mostly comprised of adults at least 30 or older. By no means am I saying this is a bad thing. However, how will the hobby thrive in the future if I (25 years old) am among its youngest consumers?

For my sociology senior thesis in 2010, I decided to investigate if these recent developments (fewer youth in the hobby and the growing number of high-end product offerings) had an effect as to "why" we collect sports trading cards today. I will admit that my previous experience in the hobby made me biased. I hypothesized that most collectors nowadays were only interested in making profit or looking for the latest card from the Beckett "Hot List." I had seen people spend hundreds of dollars on Upper Deck Exquisite or Ultimate Collection, just to lament about how they didn't pull the ultra rare LeBron James auto/patch/refractor/RC/numbered to 10. All the while, they couldn't appreciate the artistic quality of the cards or the fact that they just pulled 15 autographs from some of the most skilled basketball players in the world.

To figure out "why" individuals collect sports trading cards, I traveled to several card shows across the Midwest and researched articles found in newspapers, magazines, and scholarly journals. The vast majority of the sociology and economic literature mentioned how capitalism had influenced everything that was dysfunctional about the industry: including the lawsuits between card companies, the greed of counterfeit operations, how eBay had put card shops out of business and the fact that people often do not collect for the love of the hobby anymore. These findings certainly were in the back of my mind and seemed to confirm my initial hypothesis.

Upon arrival at the first hobby show, I was immediately inundated with flyers, coupons, and business cards of local retail shops. Some of the stores had advertisements with bold lettering and incentives such as "spend 100 dollars and get a free replica jersey." Negotiating with some of the shop owners reminded me of an episode of Pawn Stars. These initial interactions convinced me that the hobby may very well be in serious decline. That was until I encountered a few individuals during my travels.

Toward the end of the first show, I decided to purchase an item for my personal collection. I instantly became fixated on a Topps American Pie John F. Kennedy Jr. card containing remnants of the Berlin Wall and commemorating his 1963 visit there. This historic speech assured the citizens of West Berlin of America's support in their fight against Communism. The card to me was absolutely priceless and I thought it would be cool to show off to my sociology professors!


I had observed the owner for most of the day and he appeared cold and calculated on the surface. My initial interaction with him was impersonal and purely-business. After pondering his offer for a few minutes, the owner stepped away and let his son run the store for a little bit. I was touched by what his son told me that day. "My father has two of those [JFK] cards. He really enjoys them and sees them as a piece of history. Instead of selling them both, he held onto one of them to pass on to me when I get older." It was at this moment I realized that I had judged this man too quickly. I labeled him



as a greedy collectibles retailer, but not as a caring father. Shortly after, I witnessed another father and son at a nearby booth. The son was looking to purchase a lot of cards that cost about 10 cents each and had a bag of coins. He asked his son to find the coins he needed to make the purchase and they slowly counted them out together. It was absolutely amazing to see this man use the hobby as a way to teach his son math skills. These two examples demonstrated the power of trading cards to bond a parent and child.

At another show, I began talking to a card trader who was in his early 30s. We negotiated for several minutes about a Danny Granger card and ultimately, I was frustrated that we could not reach a deal. Once again, I assumed this man was just another greedy card trader. I then posed a simple question to him: why do you collect sports trading cards? He replied, "I've been collecting for about ten years now. I buy so much more than I sell and I estimate that in the long run I have probably lost thousands of dollars doing this. But I'm not really concerned with making money, I just love coming to these shows and talking "hobby" with all the other guys." Once again, I was simply amazed how my first impression was so misguided.

My experiences at these trading card shows taught me a valuable lesson about humanity. Never judge anyone at face value, but rather take a few minutes to get to know them. It is these encounters that have restored my faith in the hobby and make me believe that it will survive long into the future.


ICU patients still alive for nearly 24 hours. He tells the team of




